1.0 CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Makio at 3:35 p.m., and roll call was conducted.

2.0 APPROVAL OF MINUTES (August 13, 2015 Meeting)

Chairman Makio opened the floor for discussion on the minutes of August 13, 2015.

Motion

With no changes Rebecca Duenas motioned to approve the minutes as read. Joaquin Perez seconded the motion and was unanimously approved.

3.0 OLD BUSINESS

3.1. Section 106 - October 2015

Joe Quinata reported the training was attended by 40 participants. The training provided a better understanding of the role of the State Historic Preservation Office and gave a perspective on conducting training opportunities in the future.

3.2. National History Day/Meeting with Dr. Skinner (wife of Governor Skinner)

Joe Quinata reported as the NHD representative for the greater Pacific region and Asia he will be attending the annual meeting in Washington D.C. NHD will absorb the airfare cost. He will also attend the National Trust Conference before the NHD meetings.

After attending the conference, he will be traveling to meet the wife of former Guam Governor Skinner in Boston. A copy of a letter from Mrs. Skinner noting she would like to donate some items to the Guam Museum in memory of the late Governor was circulated.

3.3. NTHP conference

Joe Quinata reported the National Trust Conference is scheduled for November 3-6, 2015, in Washington D.C.

The operations budget will cover the costs of staff but Board travel will require approval by motion by the Board.

Chairman Makio had requested Board members to express their interest in attending and include what they want to achieve and how the Trust will benefit from their attendance. To date, only Rebecca Duenas had submitted an email expressing her interest in attending. James Viernes and Cacilie Craft were willing to attend if representation is needed.

Chairman Makio will be attending as a diversity mentor for the conference and is scheduled to attend a larger diversity round table meeting which includes the Afro American, Latino American, and the LGBTQ communities.

Motion

With no further discussion, Marilyn Salas motioned to approve travel for two Board members to attend the National Trust Conference. The motion was seconded by James Viernes and unanimously approved.

3.4 Developing Artisans Skilled in Toolmanship & Latte Carving & Quarrying

Joe Quinata reported the Grants Committee reviewed their sponsorship request submitted by Kelly Kautz. The course is being offered as a Special Projects Course at the University of Guam.

As a response to the committee's concerns, the budget was revised and resubmitted. The Board discussed funding the 1^{st} year and will consider funding the 2^{nd} year upon completion of the pilot year.

Motion

With no further discussion, Marilyn Salas motioned to approve funding the Developing Artisans Skilled in Toolmanship & Latte Carving & Quarrying Course for the amount of \$6,200.00 as a pilot program for the 1st year. The motion was seconded by Cacilie Craft and unanimously approved.

3.5 Pacific History Conference

Joe Quinata reported Dr. Anne Hattori had submitted a request for sponsorship for the Pacific History Conference scheduled for May 2016.

James Viernes elaborated on the biennial event which includes presentations by top scholars in the History discipline.

Chairman Makio opened the floor for discussion of the Board's support and level of sponsorship.

Motion

With no further discussion, Joaquin Perez motioned to approve funding \$20,000.00 as a Platinum Sponsor, on the condition that all Board member and staff are able to attend. The motion was seconded by Rebecca Duenas and passed by a majority vote. James Viernes recused from voting.

4.0 NEW BUSINESS

4.1 Agana Cathedral Basilica Bell Tower Grant

Joe Quinata reported an application for funding repairs for the Agana Cathedral was submitted.

Chairman Makio referred the application to committee for review and recommendation.

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4.2. Marianas History Conference

Joe Quinata reported the Marianas History Conference had been cancelled due to the devastation of Typhoon Soudelor. The Board initially approved sponsoring the event. Staff was informed the hosting organization had communicated directly with Board members requesting compensation for work completed in the planning of the conference. Chairman Makio opened the floor for discussion.

Motion

With no further discussion, Joaquin Perez motioned to disapprove the request submitted by Guampedia. The motion was seconded by Rebecca Duenas and unanimously approved.

5.0 COMMITTEE REPORTS

5.1. Budget & Finance Committee Report

5.1.a. YTD Balance

Joe Quinata reported the current balance fund balance is approximately \$5.9 million, with a total of \$1.4 million available for grants and projects.

The Board discussed the recent legislation diverting 50% of the overall permit fees to the Guam Museum, and limitations in funding grants and projects in the upcoming year as a result of the legislature's action.

5.2. Architecture Committee Report

5.2.a. Inarajan Homes

Joe Quinata reported bids were received for three of the four homes solicited. Contractor Z4 had submitted the lowest bid of \$602,000.00 for the Juan Flores House.

After negotiation with the contractor and a reduction of work orders, the contractor agreed to reduce their bid to \$572,000.00

The Architect Committee recommends approving \$572,000.00 for the Juan Flores House and further direct staff to solicit for re-bid for the three remaining homes.

Chairman Makio opened the floor for discussion.

Motion

With no further discussion, Joaquin Perez motioned to approve \$572,000.00 for the construction of the Juan Flores House. The motion was seconded by Rebecca Duenas and unanimously approved.

Motion

A motion was made by Rebecca Duenas to authorize staff to re-bid the Doris Lujan, Antonia Chargualaf and Juan & Petrona Meno Houses; including the teaming of the projects to solicit interest for all three homes. The motion was seconded by James Viernes and unanimously approved.

George Flores House

Legal Counsel Terrence Brooks presented the update on the purchase of the George Flores House and disclosed his relationship as the stepson with one of the property owners, Doris Flores Brooks.

In the title search process, it was discovered that the owner of the neighboring property had used a previous recorded lot for a mortgage.

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If purchase is made, GPT will be able to obtain the property title.

5.3. Grants Committee Report

Grants Committee Chair James Viernes reported the committee's review grant submissions.

5.3.a. Rehabilitation of the Archbishop Flores Home – Archbishop Anthony Apuron

The committee recommended approving the 1st step to solicit a Historic Structures Report. The Board discussed the homes listed and registered in the Hagatna Historic District. Lynda Aguon clarified the register listing and indicated the Flores Home was not included in the Hagatna Historic District.

Chairman Makio recommended proceeding with the HSR as a first step for any subsequent work for nomination and renovation.

Motion

With no further discussion, Joaquin Perez motioned to proceed with the historic structures report for the Archbishop Flores home as a first step for subsequent work for renovation. The motion was seconded by Rebecca Duenas and unanimously approved.

5.3.b. American Soil/Chamorro Soul – Jessica Peterson

The committee did not recommend approval of the application due to its lack of historical content and no listing of a project scholar in the resources.

Motion

With no further discussion, James Viernes motioned to disapprove the application. The motion was seconded by Cacilie Craft and unanimous carried.

5.3.c. Phase I – Study of a Pilot Study of Ancient mtDNA in Dentitions from the Naton Beach Site, Guam – Dr. Rosalind Hunter Anderson

The committee reviewed a revised budget, and recommends the approval of \$3028.00 for the grant.

Motion

With no further discussion, Marilyn Salas motioned to approve \$3,028.00 for the Pilot Study of Ancient mtDNA in Dentitions from the Naton Beach Site, Guam grant. The motion was seconded by Cacilie Craft and unanimously approved.

5.3.d. Who Wears the Beads? 2000 Years of Ornaments from an Archaeological Site on Guam – Judy Amesbury

The Committee reviewed the application and recommends approval of the requested \$15,000.00 for the grant.

Motion

With no further discussion, Rebecca Duenas motioned to approve \$15,000.00 for the "Who Wears the Beads?" grant. The motion was seconded by James Viernes and unanimously approved.

5.3.e. Fan Hasso Guahan - Guampedia

The Board tabled the grant for further budget review by the committee.

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5.3.f. Tan Na la'la, Ta Praktika, Para Hinemlo'ta, Outreach & Awareness Project – Haya Cultural Heritage & Preservation Development Foundation

The committee reported the applicant resubmitted a revised budget after the initial review of the application and recommends approving the revised budget of \$3930.00.

Motion

With no further discussion, Joaquin Perez motioned to approve \$3,930.00 for Tan Na la'la, Ta Praktika, Para Hinemlo'ta, Outreach & Awareness Project.

The motion was seconded by Marilyn Salas and unanimously approved.

- Anjelica Roscoe has submitted her resignation as a Special Projects Coordinator.
- The GPT Newsletter was circulated for the Board's review.

DEVELOPING ARTISANS SKILLED IN TRADITIONAL TOOLMANSHIP AND LATTE CARVING & QUARRYING

A THREE-YEAR PROJECT

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Latte are iconic. They are the most visible reminders of CHamoru achievements and, as such, are cultural identity markers for CHamoru. Latte are actively restored or recreated in various materials yet little is known about how they were quarried and put into place. The skills in quarrying them are likewise currently missing from the contemporary CHamoru cultural practitioner skill sets. Theories have been developed over the years but no one has formally tested them to understand their validity or worked to specifically reclaim and hone those skills, ensuring that they are reinstated or transmitted to succeeding generations.

This project will examine the range of types of *latte* throughout the archipelago and the theories about how they were quarried by hands-on experimentation. It will operate as a 2-semester university course. The project will recapture the skills of latte quarrying to ensure that they are once again part of the CHamoru traditional skill panoply. Over the course of three years, project participants will learn the basics of how to craft, maintain, and repair traditional tools used in latte quarrying as well as learn the skill of traditional stone masonry. Each year the project will build upon what it has learned previously working with a new cadre of students (some have already expressed interest in joining for school year 2016-2017). Additionally, students may be able to take the 1-year course more than once to further develop their skills. As a means to recapture this skill set, a certain number of the numerous theories that exist will be identified to be tested each year in order to create real understanding of the feasibility of each which will then be applied to recapturing the knowledge of latte stone masonry. Each semester they participate, students will receive certificates demonstrating the level of skill that they have developed in traditional toolmanship and stone masonry. Further, each project year, participants will be a new cadre of stone masons who have practical experience and understanding of the ancient art of latte quarrying while the testing and results will be documented in writing, photography, and video to be developed into accessible written material, exhibits, and short documentary films.

Many benefits will accrue the community of Guam from engaging and developing the traditional skill sets of our youth in their cultural history and developing their expertise and advocacy. Three sets of students will be the next generations of artisans and caretakers of their heritage. This project will cross political divides in the Mariana Islands and increase community and visitor awareness regarding CHamoru heritage.

Thus, both participants and the community at large will have a greater appreciation for their stakeholdership in preserving their unique heritage.

II. MISSION

- A. Recapture a lost skill set and knowledge base.
- B. Engage on-island and off-island Chamorro and other local youth in learning about and producing knowledge regarding their culture.
- C. Experimental anthropology and archaeology: Develop and test theories regarding *latte* quarrying through hands-on experiments conducted over a three-year period to be applied to the development of skilled artisans in traditional toolmanship and stone masonry, especially in *latte* quarrying.
- D. Develop three cadres of skilled artisans (one per school year) in traditional toolmanship and stone masonry, especially in *latte* quarrying.
- E. Cross political and academic divides between Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands (NMI) and academic disciplines in pursuing knowledge regarding Chamorro culture.
- F. Encourage collaboration between traditional experts and academics.
- G. Increase community and visitor awareness and stakeholdership regarding the promotion, maintenance, and safe-guarding of CHamoru culture.

III. GOALS

- A. Phase: Planning
 - i. Conduct background research. Acquire necessary course materials.

- a. Identify theories regarding *latte* quarrying by reviewing relevant literature, exploring the construction methods employed by those of Austronesian-descent who construct wood posts or quarry stone pillars similar to *latte*, and documenting and observing the wood posts and stone pillars similar to *latte*.
- b. Identify likely traditional tools for latte quarrying.
- c. Identify other materials needed for experimental *latte* quarrying coursework.
- ii. Develop a traditional toolmanship training program to include the crafting, maintaining, and repairing of tools.
- iii. Develop field visits and experiments to begin the honing of traditional stone masonry skills at the beginner, intermediate, and expert levels.
- iv. Acquire identified course material needs.
 - a. Latte quarrying tools (eg, shell, basalt, and metal adze).
 - b. Other materials needed to conduct *latte* quarrying experimental course.
- v. Invite traditional and academic experts in Guam and NMI to participate in the project.
- B. Phase I: Developing Traditional Toolmanship for 3 sets of students, Fall Semesters 2015, 2016, 2017
 - i. Provide contextual understanding of:
 - a. Select CHamoru cultural features related to latte quarrying.
 - b. Select regional Austronesian house pillars and burial markers.
 - c. The range of types of *latte* and theories regarding their functions.
 - d. Theories regarding latte quarrying.
 - e. Likely traditional tools for latte quarrying.
 - ii. Provide a traditional toolmanship training program to include the crafting, maintaining, and repairing of tools.
 - iii. Provide field visits and experiments to hone traditional stone masonry skills at the beginner level.
 - iv. Produce an exhibit to display the Phase I end products.
 - v. Certify each set of students each semester/year at the level of skill that they have developed in toolmanship. Students may be able to continue this course beyond the first year to attain higher levels of certification.
- C. Phase II: Developing Stone Masonry Skills, Spring Semesters 2016, 2017, 2018
 - Develop three sets of hands-on experiments to be carried out and documented. Experiments will:
 - a. Test the most plausible theories regarding *latte* quarrying methods.

- b. Test the efficacy of different tools used in quarrying *latte*.
- c. Allow university students on Guam and abroad to participate in exploring their island's cultural traditions first-hand while developing stone masonry skills.
- vi. Certify each set of students each semester/year at the level of skill that they have developed in toolmanship. Students may be able to continue this course beyond the first year to attain higher levels of certification.
- ii. Produce a site or exhibit to display the Phase II *latte* produced by the project.
- iii. Produce a film for public viewing of each year's research and field school processes and results.

IV. OUTCOMES

- A. **Three sets of skilled artisans** in traditional toolmanship and stone masonry, especially in *latte* quarrying.
- B. Increased understanding about possible I Manmofo'na (ancestral Chamorro) *latte* quarrying practices.
- C. Increased awareness and cultural pride in I Manmofo'na knowledge, ability, and skills.
- D. Increase awareness and agency of local traditional and academic experts.
- E. A report documenting research findings.
- F. Quarried *latte* will be made accessible for local and visitor viewing as a site or exhibit. The *latte*, accompanied by informative signage regarding the project, will serve as a new type of cultural site that locals and visitors can frequent while on island.
- G. Brief films providing an overview of the project processes and outcomes and findings accessible to the general public.



We are writing to you in regards to the recently cancelled Marianas History Conference, that was to be held in Saipan which GPT had agreed to sponsor for \$15,000. It had to be cancelled, as you know, due to the devastation caused by Typhoon Soudelor.

We agreed to pay Guampedia for conference planning which was some 250 hours of work. They handled the call for presentations, registration, created the letterhead and logo, created and maintained the conference website, came up with a publicity plan and implemented it. Their team handled all the conference communications with both presenters and participants.

Guampedia's work was highly successful, garnering some 60 presentations. They also prepared the abstracts and bios for the website and prepared the schedule and materials for the conference booklet.

As you know Guampedia is a non-profit organization, reliant on grants and contracts such as this to pay their staff. We understand that GPT was to be a sponsor and that since the event didn't happen the sponsorship was cancelled as well. But now we are left without a way to pay Guampedia for the work of planning this conference.

We'd like to ask for your help in finding a way for GPT to pay Guampedia for this important work. We hate to leave them in this position after they fulfilled their commitment so well. The conference planning work was set at \$4,480 which was to be paid to Guampedia.

On another note, we are still planning on e-publishing some of the conference papers. About 10 people went ahead and submitted their papers since they were already done. Additionally, several of the MHC conference presentations are making their way into other forums. Several will be featured at MARC's Lecture Series this year, and others may be included in another forum being put together by UOG - the MFA Candidates Regional Conference on regional political issues.

So the conference work will still be heard, one way or another. We appreciate your attention to this Joe! Thank you once again, for your commitment to the Marianas History Conference.


