### 1.0. CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL

The meeting was called to order at 3:10 p.m. by Chairman Michael Makio and roll call was conducted.

### 2.0. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES (February 11, 2016 Meeting)**

Chairman Makio opened the floor for discussion on the minutes of February 11, 2016. The following corrections were noted:

Page 4; Line 1; Change to read, "....is scheduled for the week of April 25-26, in Stockton..."

Motion

Page 4; Line 9; Change to read, "....was not authorized for funding by Congress..." With no further discussion or corrections, Rebecca Duenas motioned to approve the minutes with corrections. The motion was seconded by Cacilie Craft and unanimously approved.

### 3.0 **OLD BUSINESS**

### 3.1. National Trust for Historic Preservation Partners Retreat; Washington, D.C.;

Info

Joe Quinata presented a trip report of his attendance at the NTHP Partners Retreat. Highlights of the Retreat included meetings with core NTHP partners, discussing grant funding program opportunities, developing better partnerships and introducing new concepts in preservation.

### 4.0. **NEW BUSINESS**

### 4.1. Vehicle Use Policy, Guidelines & Procedure

Info

Joe Quinata presented a draft Policy for Vehicle Use, Guidelines, & Procedures. The Board briefly reviewed the draft and recommended changes, to include assignment of use, responsibility, mandatory compliance, restrictions to operate the company vehicles, and scheduling of vehicle maintenance.

The draft will be amended by Joe Quinata with the Board's recommendations then forwarded to legal counsel to finalize. The final draft will be presented for Board's approval at the next meeting.

**4.2.** Guam/National History Day, June 12 – 16, 2016; University of Maryland, MD Chairman Makio reported a letter was received from Monique Storie, Director of MARC, requesting \$28,000.00, to sustain the Guam History Day program and allow Guam students to compete in the National History Day competition in June at Maryland University.

Chairman Makio presented a brief history of GPT's appropriations for the past eight (8) years. Funding requests have decreased each successive year.

The Board reviewed the current Accounting Summary showing an unobligated amount of \$545,937.45, for grants and projects.

The Board was informed not all revenues due to GPT from the collection of permit fees for Fiscal Year 2015 have been received. Furthermore, no funds have been received for permit fees collected in FY16 due to the Government's financial crisis.

The Board discussed the recent moratorium placing a ceiling amount of \$5000.00 for grants.

Joe Quinata responded the request is a Board Initiative and not a grant.

The Board expressed support of the program but concerned of the current financial position of GPT, delays of releases from DOA, and the recent legislation decreasing revenues to the Trust.

The Board discussed options to approve the \$28,000.00 request as is, amending the amount, or not funding at all.

The Board identified surplus funding available to subsidize the request.

Joe Quinata identified the appropriation for the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration that did not occur in 2015 as scheduled.

Chairman Makio proposed to motion to move ahead with the funding with the understanding that the allocation for FY15-16 budget be adjusted downward for projects that are not proceeding, and with further understanding that there will be an effort in the subsequent year to meet and provide the benchmark programs and continued involvement of participants of secondary and post-secondary levels in the coming year.

### Motion

Joaquin Perez motioned to fund the \$28,000 for the National History Day program but must be funded from the programs that are not going to happen, mainly the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The motion was seconded Cacilie Craft.

Chairman Makio opened the floor for discussion.

Pale Eric questioned if the Board can formally defund the programs that will not proceed.

Chairman Makio responded that it can be addressed by a formal motion.

With no further discussion, the motion was unanimously approved.

### Motion

Eric Forbes motioned to defund the \$50,000.00 allocation for the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. The motion was seconded by Rebecca Duenas and unanimously approved.

### 4.3. Asian & Pacific Islander Americans In Historic Preservation (APIAHip) Conference, April 23-25, 2016; Stockton, CA

Chairman Makio reported the bi-annual conference will be held in Stockton, California.

The Guam Preservation Trust is a founding partner for the organization and has historically funded the closing reception for the conference.

A letter requesting support for the 2016 Conference was received but did not specify any amount of financial support.

Chairman Makio gave a background of GPT's support over the past three conferences to use as frame of reference.

The Board discussed networking support of GPT's position with the programmatic agreement.

Joe Quinata reported the Stockton APIAHip members are coordinating the conference. Chairman Makio noted due to the budget situation GPT's contribution would be smaller in comparison to the past.

Joe Quinata gave the options to use the CPO discretionary authority of \$500.00, or an amount to be approved by the Board. The support is needed for securing the venue for the conference.

The Board discussed how APIAHip played a vital role in supporting GPT's effort to save Pagat.

James Viernes suggested offering scholarships to students or participants to attend on the condition that a specific assignment will be due to GPT thereafter.

### Motion

With no further discussion, James Viernes motioned to appropriate an amount not to exceed 10% of the previous year's commitment (\$2,000.00) to support the APIAHip 2016 Conference with the condition that the funding goes toward scholarships for Guam students and interested persons.

The motion was seconded by Rebecca Duenas and unanimously approved.

Chairman Makio entertained any Board members interested in attending the 2016 Conference.

Four Board members expressed their interest in attending.

### Motion

James Viernes motioned to approve funding of four Board members to attend the 2016 APIAHip conference. The motion was seconded by Cacilie Craft and unanimously approved.

### Vehicle Use Policy, Guidelines and Procedures

### **OVERVIEW**

As an authorized driver of a company vehicle, you have been given certain privileges. You assume the duty of obeying all motor vehicle laws, maintaining the vehicle properly at all times and following the policies and procedures outlined in the following

### **VEHICLE USE**

- You have been provided a company vehicle primarily to assist you in your job. Its use is strictly limited to business purposes. It may not be used for personal reasons.
- Loaning the vehicle to friends, neighbors, relatives or anyone else is in violation of company policy.
- From time to time, you may have a need to carry business associates; however, transporting strangers or hitchhikers is a violation of company policy.

### VEHICLE CARE

All company-provided vehicles are designated as "non-smoking" areas. You are expected to keep your vehicle in a clean, well-maintained condition.

### TIRE CARE AND REPLACEMENT

Tire mileage is directly proportional to driver techniques, alignment, tire pressure and wheel balance. All of these factors are under your control. Tire pressures must be checked regularly (and kept at a PSI level as designated in the vehicle manual or as designated on the inside door panel of the vehicle) and tires visually inspected. Alignment and wheel balance problems must be corrected immediately to avoid drastic tire wear.

### MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR

Neglecting to maintain a vehicle could result in the driver being charged for any resulting repairs. Unusual wear and tear above industry average or neglecting to maintain your company-provided vehicle may result in the loss of your vehicle and further disciplinary action.

It is the driver's responsibility to have the scheduled maintenance performed at the designated intervals to ensure maximum vehicle performance for safety, operating efficiency and extended life of the vehicle:

- Change oil according to manufacturer's suggested maintenance schedule
- Keep tires inflated to the proper PSI rating

- Have tires rotated every 10,000 miles
- Frequently inspect belts and hoses for cracks, leaks or loose fittings

Driver safety checklists should be performed in writing at least once per month. Drivers should inspect all safety related equipment, including headlights, taillights, brake lights, turn signals, running lights, license plate lights, etc. Also, check tire tread for proper tread depth, windshield wipers and horn operation.

This policy has been prepared as an orientation on what is expected of you in the operation and maintenance of your company vehicle. GUAM PRESERVATION TRUST will provide you with safe, dependable transportation. In turn, you are entrusted to use good judgment and have a complete understanding of the responsibilities involved, both of which are necessary to continue to drive a company provided vehicle on company business.

Any driver of a company vehicle (or driving on company business in any manner) must meet the following requirements:

- Possess a valid driver's license
- Maintain an acceptable driving record per company policy
- Follow the guidelines stated in this policy at all times

### **ACCIDENTS**

A valid insurance card and vehicle registration shall be carried in the vehicle at all times. In the event that you are involved in an accident, please follow these instructions:

- 1. When an accident involves another vehicle, obtain the following information:
  - Driver's name (and owner's name if different from the driver)
  - Address
  - Telephone number
  - Name of insurance company and policy number
  - VIN, vehicle year, make and model
  - Vehicle license plate number
- 2. If possible, obtain names, addresses and telephone numbers of any witnesses, including name, badge number, department name and address of any investigating law enforcement agency.
- 3. Identify yourself and show your driver's license and insurance identification card. Do not discuss insurance policy. Do not assume the blame for the accident and, above all, do not agree to any settlement.
- 4. Cooperate with the investigating law enforcement officers. Answer their questions factually and avoid commentary beyond that. Do not insist that a citation be issued to the other operator. Despite your opinion, the officer may be trying to decide responsibility for the accident and an overly aggressive attitude on your part may result in a decision against you. In a given situation, the officer might ask if you want a citation issued to the operator. If so, answer in the affirmative and explain that this is your company's preference.

- 5. Note if there are any injuries reported by anyone involved in the accident.
- 6. It is your responsibility to notify any local agency (police, etc.) of the accident and to file the appropriate written report as required by local law, in addition to notifying management.
- 7. If an adjuster or any other representative from the other driver's insurance company contacts you for a statement (either written or recorded), refer that person to management.
- 8. If it is determined that the driver is at fault, you will be financially responsible for the deductible as prescribed by the vehicle's insurance company.
- 9. If you are found to be under the influence of drugs or alcohol at the time of the accident, regardless of whether you are found at fault or not, your employment will be terminated.

### TRAFFIC AND PARKING VIOLATIONS

<u>Minor violations include:</u> Three minor violations within a 12-month period or five minor violations during a three-year period will result in loss of company-provided vehicle and losing the privilege of driving on company business, in any manner. It may also subject you to further disciplinary action, including possible employment termination.

- Speeding less than 25 mph over the limit
- Failure to wear seat belt
- Failure to stop at a stop sign or stop light

<u>Major violations include:</u> If you receive a major driving violation conviction, it will result in loss of company-provided vehicle and you will lose the privilege of driving on company business in any manner. It may also subject you to further disciplinary action, including possible employment termination.

- Driving under a suspended or revoked license
- Hit and run or leaving the scene of an accident
- Vehicle theft due to negligence (including failure to park the vehicle in a secure, well-lit area or parking
- garage, failure to lock doors, leaving keys in plain view, or leaving a vehicle running while unattended)
- Vehicular manslaughter, homicide or assault arising out of the operation of a motor vehicle
- Use of false motor vehicle documents, such as license or registration
- Failure to obey school crossing guard or any school bus violation
- Passing on the wrong side, on a hill or where prohibited
- Reckless, careless or negligent driving
- Driving on the wrong side of a divided roadway
- Participating in racing or a speeding contest
- Driving while under the influence of alcohol, even if under the legal limit; driving while intoxicated at the

- legal limit or above; and/or driving while under the influence of drugs, whether prescription drugs or any
- controlled/illegal substances
- Implied consent or refusing the test
- Speeding more than 24 mph over the limit
- Eluding a police officer
- Failure to keep an acceptable motor vehicle record

Company-provided vehicle privilege or driving on company business in any manner may be reinstated after 12 months from the date of loss of privilege, provided a clean driving record (no moving violations or at-fault Accidents) has been maintained, at the discretion of management.

Each driver is responsible for prompt payment of any fine incurred as a result of unlawful operation or illegal parking of the company vehicle.

### MOTOR VEHICLE RECORD CHECK

Continued eligibility to drive a company-provided vehicle, or driving on company business in any manner, requires each driver to maintain a safe and clean driving record. This means that GUAM PRESERVATION TRUST Management reserves the right to review driving records at least once every year.

This school year, over 600 Guam students from the private, public, and defense schools researched, wrote, and presented Guam's history in various formats such as documentary, website, exhibit, performance, and paper. This was made possible through the Guam History Day program, an initiative of the Guam Preservation Trust and now a program administered by the Micronesian Area Research Center at the University of Guam. How students learn Guam's History is beginning to shift from the textbook-based curriculum to the methodology of research-based, writing, and presentation. We believe that as we continue with this trend, our children will learn the skills necessary to succeed in life and most importantly know their history and who they are.

Funding the Guam History Day program is a shared responsibility and we are exploring ways to allow the community to take ownership by assisting us to sustain a great program for our children. Our goal is to raise \$53,405.75 to sustain this program. For the past six years, the Guam Preservation Trust has been subsidizing most of the program costs for the island-wide and national competitions. This year we are aggressively seeking funding from the community to help subsidize the program to allow all eligible students to compete at the national competitions. Student and teachers are already asked to pay for certain program requirements (registration fees, per diem, travel insurance, uniforms, and other incidentals). All of the program monies received will go towards the program competitions both locally and nationally.

We ask your continued help by sponsoring \$28,000.00 to sustain the program and allow our Guam students the opportunity to compete at the national history day competition this school year (2016).


