#### 1.0. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Makio at 3:07 p.m. and roll call was conducted.

#### 2.0. APPROVAL OF MINUTES (July 8, 2020 Meeting)

Chairman Makio opened the floor for discussion on the minutes of July 8, 2020.

#### Motion

There being no discussion, a motion was made by David Atienza to approve the minutes as read. The motion was seconded by Nicole Calvo and unanimously approved.

#### 3.0. OLD BUSINESS

##### 3.1. Telework Policy

#### Action

Joe Quinata reported the revised telework policy will be finalized and circulated to the Board before the end of the week.

The revised telework policy will address the Board's recommendation to apply to all disasters.

Nicole Calvo recommended the telework policy also be allowable if immediate family members are affected by the pandemic.

#### 4.0. NEW BUSINESS

##### 4.1. FY2021 ADMIN AND OPERATIONS BUDGET

Chairman Makio reported the Budget & Finance Committee met to review the proposed FY2021 administrative and operations budget.

Joe Quinata reported the proposed FY2021 budget reflected a 12.5% reduction from the FY2020 budget.

Chairman Makio presented the details of the proposed \$611,455.62 budget as follows: Personnel \$301,575.43; Fringe Benefits \$102,867.79; Utilities, Communication, & Insurance \$50,000.00; Staff Travel \$7,000.00; Equipment \$4,000.00; Automobile Expense \$6,500.00; Supplies \$1,800.00; Contractual \$97,000.00; Stipends \$7,000.00; Advertisement \$3,100.00; Post Office/Postage \$300.00; Dues & Subscription \$1,350.00; Employee Incentives \$15,000.00; and Miscellaneous \$13,962.40.

The Committee decided to establish a budget for grants at a later time.

Eric Forbes raised a concern of the budget reduction and its effect on the work produced by the staff.

Joe Quinata responded that the staff oversees ongoing GPT grants and multi-year programs for grants awarded from the Dept. of Interior and the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The reduction of the budget will not jeopardize current programs.

The Board discussed a possible increase in the budget of supplies for purchase of plexiglass for employee desks and sanitizing supplies to ensure a safe workspace for the employees and interaction with the public.

Joe Quinata responded the contingency budget category can address these costs.

The Board commented the use of the travel budget may be impacted by the pandemic and current travel restrictions.

#### **Motion**

With no further discussion, Nicole Calvo motioned to accept and approve the FY2021 budget of \$611,455.62. The motion was seconded by David Atienza.

With no further discussion the motion was unanimously approved.

#### **4.2. Modern Guam Rises from the Destruction of War: 1945-1970 - Guampedia**

Joe Quinata reported Guampedia has submitted a request to fund \$37,962.00 for Part II of the writing and video production for the grant. Guampedia has completed Part I of the five (5) year grant.

A copy of the grant was provided for Board's review.

With no objection from the Board, Chairman Makio referred the application to the Grants Committee for review and recommendation to the Board at the next meeting.

### **5.0. COMMITTEE MEETINGS**

#### **5.1. Budget & Finance Committee Report**

Joe Quinata reported the current fund balance is \$1,589,864.37.

A total of \$923,747.53 has been obligated for grants and projects leaving a remainder of \$666,116.84 for grants, projects, and the FY2021 administrative & operations budget. GPT is anticipating an additional release of \$250,000.00 from the collection of permit fees for the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of FY2020.

**Archbishop Flores House**

Chairman Makio reported GPT is still pursuing the purchase of the Archbishop Flores House but awaiting concurrence of the courts.

**5.3. Grants Committee Report****Refer to Report****Architecture and Architects for Guam Book**

Joe Quinata reported the Architecture Book for Guam book launch was a success.

The event was held in collaboration with AIA and attended primarily by architecture and engineering firms on the island.

A virtual presentation was made by author, Jack Jones.

Copies of the book will be distributed to all the libraries on island.

**Guam Historic Courthouse**

Joe Quinata reported due to COVID19 pandemic a request for a no-cost extension to December 2021 was submitted by the applicant. GPT will be included in the development of the plan and the A&E design.

**Ekungok I Estoria-ta Project**

Joe Quinata recommended for the Board to log onto the [pacificpreservation.org](http://pacificpreservation.org) website to obtain the details and progress of the project.

**5.4. Archaeology Committee Report****Refer to Report****Archaeological Studies at San Dionisio & Palacio, Humatak**

Joe Quinata reported the Spanish archaeologists are still scheduled to arrive in November to analyze the samples and materials now being stored on the 1<sup>st</sup> floor of the GPT office.

**Archaeological Training for High School Students**

Joe Quinata reported the archaeological training has been postponed due to the COVID19 pandemic and will commence once conditions are improved.

**6.0. OPEN DISCUSSION****8th Annual Programmatic Agreement Workshop**

Chairman Makio reported with the limited seating available, he had attended the workshop via the Adobe Meeting Platform.

A very informative power point presentation was made. Copies of the presentation were provided in the Board packets.

The workshop was well attended and the presentation was more concise.

Ideas were more articulate and overall more productive of the thoughts and ideas that were on the minds of the attendees who expressed the concerns to resolve and not sacrifice archaeological artifacts and resources.

The firm Garcia and Associates gave a compelling summary of their archaeological findings.

Chairman Makio had requested Joe Quinata to reach out to Garcia and Associates to make a presentation to the Board to hear any of their recommendations, prioritization, and treatment of the historical features that may have been jeopardized.

Joe Quinata advised that Garcia and Associates are contracted by the Navy and may need to follow protocols when providing archaeological services.

The workshop also included a discussion on the limitation and need for repository space.

**Action** Joe Quinata requested to establish a committee on GPT's concerns of Preservation in Place.  
With no objections, Chairman Makio established a committee and extended an invitation to all board members to discuss concerns of the impacts on the programmatic agreement, the buildup, and prioritization of preservation in place.  
Dave Atienza noted public outreach is the important key to bring the information to the public without fear.

**Action** Joe Quinata will be scheduling a planning committee meeting to look at places at Hila'an and Atantano. The date and time will be announced.

Chairman Makio commended Pale Eric Forbes for hosting and organizing history presentations and activities on-line.

The Board expressed gratitude to Joe Quinata for coming out forthright in facing the pandemic situation.

Board members were encouraged to stay safe and to take all precautions to prevent the spread of the virus.

Chairman Makio reported the APT Conference is scheduled for October in Edmonton, Canada. If interested, Board members may attend on-line.  
The time difference may present a challenge for Guam attendees.

Joe Quinata reported the National Trust Conference is scheduled for November and virtual attendance is made available for all attendees.

**Action** The information and details will be circulated to all Board members.

## **INTRODUCTION**

The Guam Preservation Trust Fiscal Year Administration & Operations Budget is prepared annually as a fiducial duty and fiscal responsibility of the Trust Board and Staff.

Members of the GPT Budget & Finance Committee have developed a true cost program budget through the assessment of program performance and the analysis of revenues and cash flow projections to reflect current obligations and proposed outcomes.

The proposed FY 2021 Administration and Operations Budget total of \$611,455.62 reflects a decrease of \$86,664.25 from FY 2020 (\$698,119.87). Estimated revenue of \$180,000.00 from Building Permit Fees is anticipated accumulatively by the end of Fiscal Year 2021. The anticipated revenue does not include other revenues from grants and donations (estimated at \$200,000.00). Personnel (Five FTE) costs account for about 50% of the total budget with remaining 50% account for operations and other administrative costs.

# Guampedia - Guam Preservation Trust Grant Application

## Criterion 1: Introduction and Project Overview/ Summary

### *Modern Guam Rises from the Destruction of War: 1945 - 1970 (YEAR 2)*

This grant application is for **the second year of a five year grant** plan. The entire project is as outlined here:

The Post War Era (1945-1950) and Guamanian Era (1950-1970) on Guam mark significant changes that shaped the island's present. After World War II, land was taken and villages were moved to accommodate new military bases, CHamorus fought harder for a larger degree of self-governance, and strongly asserted their agency against US Naval governance.

Once a civilian government was founded in 1950, CHamorus of Guam gained US citizenship and the Government of Guam was established. Later the island held its first popular gubernatorial election, and then an election for a Congressional representative. Guam's economy drastically changed from a subsistence style to a money economy. No longer were people living off the land and from the sea for their main source of food. Instead they held down jobs, buying food and clothing at stores. Ranches were still kept up but were not the main source of sustenance, bringing about a massive change in lifestyle and culture.

In order to document this formative period from both a historical and CHamoru centric perspective, which will help us understand the present, Guampedia intends to conduct first-hand interviews with local figures at the forefront of these political and social changes. A lot of the oral history documentation that has been done focuses on war experiences and not about the subsequent eras. In addition, much of these oral histories are a part of private collections that are not freely accessible. That is why this work is urgent, as many of these untold stories are in danger of being lost as elders are passing on. We plan to document these stories through video and audio recordings and with historic photos, to preserve a multi-dimensional view of these historic periods. In order to support the preservation of the indigenous language of Guam, Guampedia will conduct the interviews in CHamoru with informants that are native-born speakers whenever possible.

Document and book research will also be of importance. Through the course of the project, Guampedia will collaborate with the Richard F. Taitano's Micronesia Area Research Center at the University of Guam and other regional sources to support the oral histories. Guampedia will also continue to conduct outreach efforts for this project in an effort to identify and locate potential informants. This initiative will span **a five-year period**, during which different topics that encompass the rapid transformation of Guam's cultural landscape over this 25 year period will be academically documented through written entries and multimedia presentations of oral history.

The research materials and recorded oral history will be freely accessible through Guampedia and documented for future generations, for use in schools and in the community, for the longevity of Guam history. Accompanying lesson plans will also be produced for educators that will be aligned with the Department of Education's Curriculum Standards.

We expect that many reports from that era can also be digitized and e-published in Guampedia to include but not limited to the Guam Economic Annual Reports produced by the Guam Department of Commerce, planning documents, public speeches, petitions, etc.

To ensure Guampedia documents as much of Guam's cultural landscape during this time period, categories that will be explored will include social organizations, customs and traditions, religion, language, arts and literature, forms of government and economic systems.

Guampedia plans to keep in line with the CHamoru centric point of view of the Guam Museum's Permanent Exhibition the *I Hinanaot'ta* Exhibition as well. The topics in the *I Hinanaot'ta* exhibit that are in this time period (1945-1970):

- Land taking and Displacement
- Liberation - July 21, 1941 to 1970
- From Subsistence to a Wage Based Economy
- The Rebuilding of Guam (1945-1950)
- The Beginning of Civil Rule
- Organic Act of Guam and Citizenship
- Taking a Stand for Justice
- Political Leaders: Appointed Governors, Legislators, First Elected Governors, Washington Delegate

### **Anticipated Highlights of the Project**

- Architecture: The introduction of new ways of building. We will feature some unique buildings from these early times such as those designed by architect Richard Nuetra (Government House, Adelup, and FQ Sanchez school). Guampedia currently has entries on building methods including wood-tin, quonset, changes in construction style and hollow block.
- Government: The history of the Government of Guam agencies with the names and terms of directors. Guampedia currently has Guam Port Authority up to 1970 and Guam Memorial Hospital.
- Education: Guam's schools and the people they are named after. Guampedia currently has seven completed. Guampedia has entries about education up through WWII, but not for this era.
- Media: The beginnings of a free press - Newspapers, Magazines, Radio, Television histories. Guampedia currently has an entry on Communications and Transportation Advancement in the US Naval Era.
- Business: Many businesses on Guam today were established during this period. What were they and how did they get started? Guampedia currently has some entries on the Guam Chamber of Commerces pioneers but is missing quite a few. We will also create entries on the evolution of Guam's economy from agriculture to wage-earning, and provide the history of businesses from these eras.

- Economic System/Subsistence to Wage Base: Guampedia currently has entries up through WWII and just a few others - banking, tourism and Lifting of Security Clearance.
- Social and Political Organizations: Guampedia currently has entries on the political parties and an extensive section on CHamoru Efforts toward Self Determination which includes Efforts to Reunify the Marianas. We can add oral interviews to round these out.
- People: Guam's international community blossomed during this period - Filipinos, Chinese, Americans, Japanese, Koreans and even a few Indians came to Guam to start businesses. They opened schools, established churches and organized events that helped to shape the Guam of today. Guampedia currently has entries on Filipinos.
- Guam's Capital City: The story of re-creation of Hagåtña after World War II, looking at what was lost and what was gained. We'll tell the story of how several US Congressmen had streets named after them in Hagåtña (O'Brien Dr. etc).

### **Plan of Action**

**Year 1** - Speak with elders and resource review. Outcome by the end of Year 1 - Oral history interviews, resource compilation and a solid list of entries and content for Guampedia.

**Year 2** - 15 new written entries and some oral history interviews for Guampedia, to include accompanying media (videos, photos, digitized documents when appropriate).

**Year 3** - 15 new written entries and some oral history interviews for Guampedia, to include accompanying media (videos, photos, digitized documents when appropriate).

**Year 4** - 15 new written entries and some oral history interviews for Guampedia, to include accompanying media (videos, photos, digitized documents when appropriate).

**Year 5** - 15 new written entries and some oral history interviews for Guampedia, to include accompanying media (videos, photos, digitized documents when appropriate) and lesson plans for primary and secondary levels.

### **Criterion 2: Need for Assistance**

Guampedia recently surveyed its users to see what their priorities were for adding new content to Guampedia, collecting 130 responses in 5 days. Additionally we use the "Contact Us" feature in Guampedia to allow users to tell us what they are seeking. People call our office to ask for information as well. We used these responses to help us develop this project.

A recent survey by the UOG CHamoru Studies program, too showed that the students need more resources particularly to listen to CHamoru conversations. Oral history and CHamoru perspectives are lacking for student research.

This application fits into GPT's strategic plan in two areas:

- **Resources, technology, research and development** - Educational materials on Guam's history including prehistory for schools. This project would further the Guam Preservation Trust strategic plan under its "Resources, Technology, Research and Development" goal to create educational materials on Guam's history for schools. Guampedia will be able to create more entries under two different eras, with important information about the history of Government of Guam — and how CHamorus formed their own government (based off the Naval structure)

- **Community-based projects** - Post War Oral Histories Project; Political Development, Social, etc. This project fits as a "Community-based project" under the Guam Preservation Trust strategic plan, documenting post-war oral history, and political and social development. Through interviewing people who lived during these eras and recording their oral history, this helps fulfill the Guam Preservation Trust's goal of recording these stories and developments in history. The project will include entries on notable community figures, and what life was like during this period.

This project also falls under multiple Guam Preservation Trust grant programs:

**Archival Research:** The project focuses on broad patterns of events significant in Guam's history, as outlined under GPT's Archival program. Guampedia research will contribute to entries to show how the island changed after World War II, including land ownership, a shift from agricultural to wage economy, and building the Government of Guam. The research materials and recorded oral history will contribute to Guampedia as a valuable online resource on Guam and CHamoru history. The period from 1945 to 1970 will be historically documented for future generations.

**Architectural History:** The project will include architectural research on historic structures on Guam from this time frame. One of the proposed highlights of this project is to show changes to architecture with the introduction of new ways of building. We will feature some unique buildings from these early times, including those designed by architect Richard Nuetra (Government House, Adelup, and FQ Sanchez school). Information on these architectural facets of Guam history is not accessible online for the general public. This project will create new resources and online documentation of Guam architectural practices and influences during the set era.

**Miscellaneous:** Under this Guam Preservation Trust grant program, a proposal submitted must have strong justification as to how it advances the agency, and how it will provide a public benefit worth the costs proposed. This project is aligned with GPT's vision of historic preservation as a public responsibility through education, fostering cooperation and advocacy that connect to Guam's cultural heritage. It also supports GPT's mission to preserve and protect Guam's historic sites, culture, and perspectives for the benefit of the community and our future.



This project supports four of GPT's mandates that focus on this time period:

- Architectural and archeological history and documentation of historic structures and sites;
- Ethnography and Oral History
- Archival research and investigations for locating, recording and protecting sites of historic or prehistoric interest of value;
- And to support other activities directly related to increasing the public appreciation of, and benefit from historic places including public interpretation and presentation as the research Guampedia conducts can be used for interpretation.

**Statement of the organization's mission and a concise summary of its long range goals.**

Guampedia, Guam's online encyclopedia, seeks to take Guam's citizens and the worldwide community on an educational journey, using the World Wide Web, providing comprehensive entries and media (i.e. photographs, audio and visual components) on our island's rich history and culture.

Guampedia is a project of both principle and substance – principle in its determination to accurately describe and place the island's vast heritage in the local and global consciousness – and substance in the execution of strategies to create an online encyclopedia of quality and integrity through which current and future generations can document the multi-faceted history and culture of Guam.

**Mission Statement**

*We believe that the future of our island is dependent upon an informed, educated citizenry. Scarce resources result in limited opportunities to learn and understand about Guam's unique history, culture, environment and present-day society. Guampedia exists to provide a comprehensive, accessible resource about Guam that will educate the global community and increase opportunities for the enlightenment of our people, allowing us to chart our destiny.*

The ultimate goal of Guampedia is to create a valuable information and research tool that combines bibliographies, databases, descriptive entries, essays, online access to primary source material, interpretive essays, curriculum and lesson plans, biographies, historical maps, illustrations, photographs and broadcast media. Users are provided with a vast array of information covering a wide range of topics about Guam, all of which are written by scholars or experts in the field, peer reviewed, fact checked and edited through a rigorous editorial process.

Guampedia is intended to spur critical thinking about the island and its people. The

primary objectives of the Guampedia project revolve around preservation, access and education:

- Preservation of Guam's history and culture through conveyance of important events and people in encyclopedia entries;
- Access to text with photographs and the knowledgeable voices of elders who have lived through these events; and
- Education through locally produced and focused material on the island's heritage for schoolchildren on Guam and for a worldwide public in order to strengthen global knowledge of Guam through accurate and well-written texts, and in most cases, locally-produced short films or documentaries.

### **Criterion 3: Project Approach**

Guampedia, an ongoing project since 2002, is slowly filling in Guam's history in our online database as our limited resources allow. To add information and entries to Guampedia online, the local academic community has defined eras of Guam history for us to follow. Based on the collective guidance from Guam history scholars, Guampedia has worked on expanding the ancient Guam section, with funding from the Guam Preservation Trust. Guampedia has also created extensive entries for the US Naval era, with funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Guampedia wants to develop these sections of history next, from 1945 to 1970. It is imperative we work on these eras as soon as possible, because there are still members of the community alive who know this history intimately — but they are elderly, and we need to record their stories before they die and make them freely accessible.

Through online surveys Guampedia has conducted, and conversations and telephone calls to our office, we have learned people in the community want information on this period in history. Information on these eras is not easily attainable by the general public, so creating this resource would be helpful for educators, students, the community at large, and those living abroad.

- Created a comprehensive list of resources and materials available to support the production of written entries.
- Developed a list of topics for the 60 new entries which will be developed over the following four years.

## **Criterion 4: Organizational Capacity**

Guampedia.com is a community project that highlights the unique history of Guam and the CHamoru heritage of the Mariana Islands. Through peer-reviewed entries and accompanying media, Guampedia provides an important educational and informational resource for Guam teachers and students, for CHamorus living away from the Marianas, for visitors, and for those who want a richer understanding of the island and its people.

Guampedia is the first project of its kind for Guam - created by the Guam Humanities Council in 2002, with grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the US Department of Interior. It was launched in 2008 with the first 350 entries. In 2009, Guampedia left the Humanities Council and became its own registered nonprofit and an affiliate program of the University of Guam's Richard F. Taitano Micronesian Area Research Center (MARC). The Guampedia office is located at House No. 3, Dean's Circle, University of Guam, Mangilao.

Operations are funded by a legislative appropriation stemming from Guam's Hotel Occupancy Tax, with new content development funded by grants from the Guam Preservation Trust, Guam Council on the Arts & Humanities and other local sources.

Guampedia partners with many other community organizations, including the Department of CHamoru Affairs, the Guam Museum, the Guam Visitors Bureau and the Guam Department of Parks and Recreation's Division of Historic Resources.

Currently, Guampedia has more than 1,200 entries, 3,500 photographs, numerous video and audio clips and dozens of e-publications. More than 150 people have been involved in this project to date. It is an ongoing and dynamic project and is updated and added to regularly as events unfold and technology allows.

Since 2014, Guampedia has consistently maintained about 25,000 unique visits per month. In 2018 Guampedia consistently maintained more than 50,000 unique visits per month, reaching about 80,000 visitors per month four times. About 50% of visitors are from the US mainland, with 30% from Guam and the other 20% from the Northern Marianas, Philippines, Japan, South Korea and other places worldwide, as far as the United Kingdom.

In 2019, Guampedia was officially endorsed by the Guam Education Board as an educational resource in teaching Guam history and culture for the Department of Education's public school system.

#### **Guampedia Staff**

**Rita Pangelinan Nauta** has been serving Guam's online resource, as Managing Director since 2011. Her focus has been on community outreach, creating initiatives, partnerships and projects for Guampedia. Her more than 25 years of experience in marketing communications encompassed local, regional and global markets. Having coordinated local and international marketing initiatives for the Guam Economic Development Authority for nine years, she has also managed the production and coordination of a myriad of product and service launches, including Guampedia.com and other community-based initiatives over the last 16 years. Since 2002, Nauta has also been a marketing instructor and conducting professional development training in Guam, Saipan and Palau. Nauta speaks fluent CHamoru. She has also produced and directed Guampedia's documentaries such as *I Tinituhon: Puntan yan Fu'una and Hasso, I Guinahan Guahan: Guam's Unique Sense of Place*. Nauta has also been involved in featured local productions of *Amazing Race*, *Destination Truth*, and *Beachfront Bargain Hunt*.

**Nathalie Pereda**, has served as Guampedia's media editor since January 2007. She is responsible for managing Guampedia's media database, which includes photos, drawings, maps, charts, video and audio. Nathalie Pereda earned a BFA in material studies with an emphasis on metal and wood design from Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Virginia awarded in 2006. Pereda has been a metal artist since 2004 and her work mainly consists of small to medium scale sculptures and jewelry. She creates ifil wood jewelry for sale and exhibition at Guinahan Chamoru shop. She is the first female student with an apprenticeship under Joaquin "Tun Jack" Lujan, Guam's master blacksmith and recipient of the prestigious National Heritage Fellowship Award. Pereda continues to learn traditional metal working techniques in order to make the tools that were once necessary for hunting and survival on Guam's early farms. Pereda is also a volunteer for Inadahen Lina'la Kotturan Chamoru, Inc., a non-profit organization which aims to preserve and promote the CHamoru culture and is working to build a cultural center for local artists, craftsmen and *serujanas/serujanas* (traditional CHamoru healers).

**Lazaro Quinata** is a Sociology major and CHamoru Studies minor at the University of Guam. He has contributed and collaborated with Guampedia in a professional capacity multiple times over the past four years and officially joined the Guampedia team as Media Production and Research Assistant in November 2018. Quinata has represented Guam in the National History Day Competition in the documentary category for the majority of his middle and high school career, garnering third place nationwide in 2015 with his group entry titled, "The 9th Guam Congress: Catalyzing Change, Revolutionizing Politics." Quinata has been advocating for the practice and preservation of CHamoru culture. He has worked closely with the Guam Preservation Trust, Humatak Community Foundation, and University of Guam's CHamoru Club, Mañe'lon Marianas, on a variety of projects and events aimed at the promotion of the culture locally and abroad.

Guampedia's financial position is healthy with three regular sources of income - an annual government of Guam appropriation, contract work within the community and sales of our book "101 Amazing Facts," "Famalaon Guahan: Women In Guam History" and other items in our online giftshop.

Guampedia began receiving an appropriation in FY2010 drawn from the Tourist Attraction Fund. Initially it was \$140,000 a year but was raised to \$200,000 in FY2012 and has been consistent each year.

Additionally, Guampedia has developed a global network of academic support for our work over the many years of research and publishing. Our media editor, Nathalie Pereda, is perhaps one of the most knowledgeable people for historic photographs about Guam.

## **Criteria 5: Project Impact and Evaluation**

### **Impact of project:**

- Production of freely accessible on-line resources of written and multi-media entries for this 25 year time period.
- Provides students and researchers scholarly resources on topics during this time period.
- Create opportunities for students, organizations and researchers to produce research projects and program presentations in community-based activities and programs such as Guam History Day, CHamoru Cultural Heritage Program with Department of Education, and projects and forums on history and cultural heritage.

### **Evaluation:**

- At the end of the first year of this project, Guampedia will survey scholars, educators and researchers to evaluate the list of categories and topics produced.
- At the end of the subsequent years (second through fifth) Guampedia's google analytics report will determine the access traffic to these entries.
- Guampedia also uses the feedback mechanism within each entry "How Useful Was this Entry?" to evaluate its content.

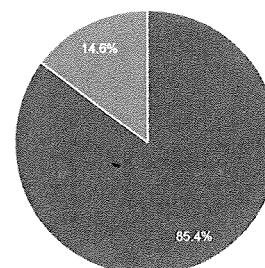

- Prior meeting with Guam Preservation Trust and SHPO staff showed potential opportunity of using publicly-accessible areas of Camp Blaz Main Gate area of Camp Blaz for outdoor/indoor interpretation
- The outdoor component is currently unfunded; The indoor component has funding approval, outreach for ideas will continue
- The following are a summary of desirable components from early stakeholder feedback:
  - Outdoor display of artifacts, native plants and trees
  - Use of murals, woven goods, tools, etc. by traditional artists
  - Provide simple/accessible information from archaeological research

# J-755 CONVOY VEHICLE OPERATORS COURSE (SLIDE 3 OF 3)

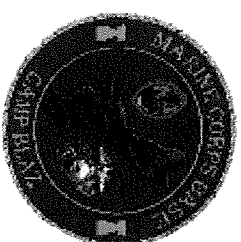


- Most discoveries are at the Convoy Vehicle Operators Course (CVOC), due North of the Mogfog Depression.
- At this time only parts of the discoveries are known as they likely extend beyond the footprint
- Navy will first determine the boundaries of the potential sites
- Once sites are deemed eligible, opportunities for practicable design measures for preservation will be analyzed
- If a site cannot be avoided, data recovery will be a secondary consideration in coordination with the SHPO.

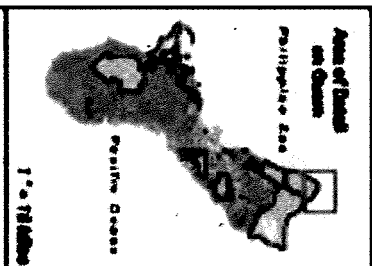
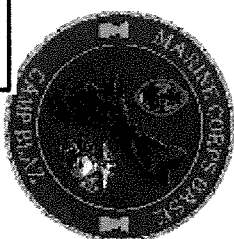
### P-103 AND P-735



- Funding for these and a limited number of Relocation projects was deferred for construction of the US-Mexico border wall
- As a result, construction award is pending funds
- Based on results of monitoring at P-715, the Navy is coordinating with SHPO regarding plans to include monitoring for P-735, the Multi-Purpose Machine Gun Range
  - Plan is to conduct pre-clearing survey/inspections and monitoring of ground disturbance post-clearing
  - terrain considerations (next slide)
  - An amendment to the 2018 JRM-SHPO Dispute Resolution Agreement is necessary

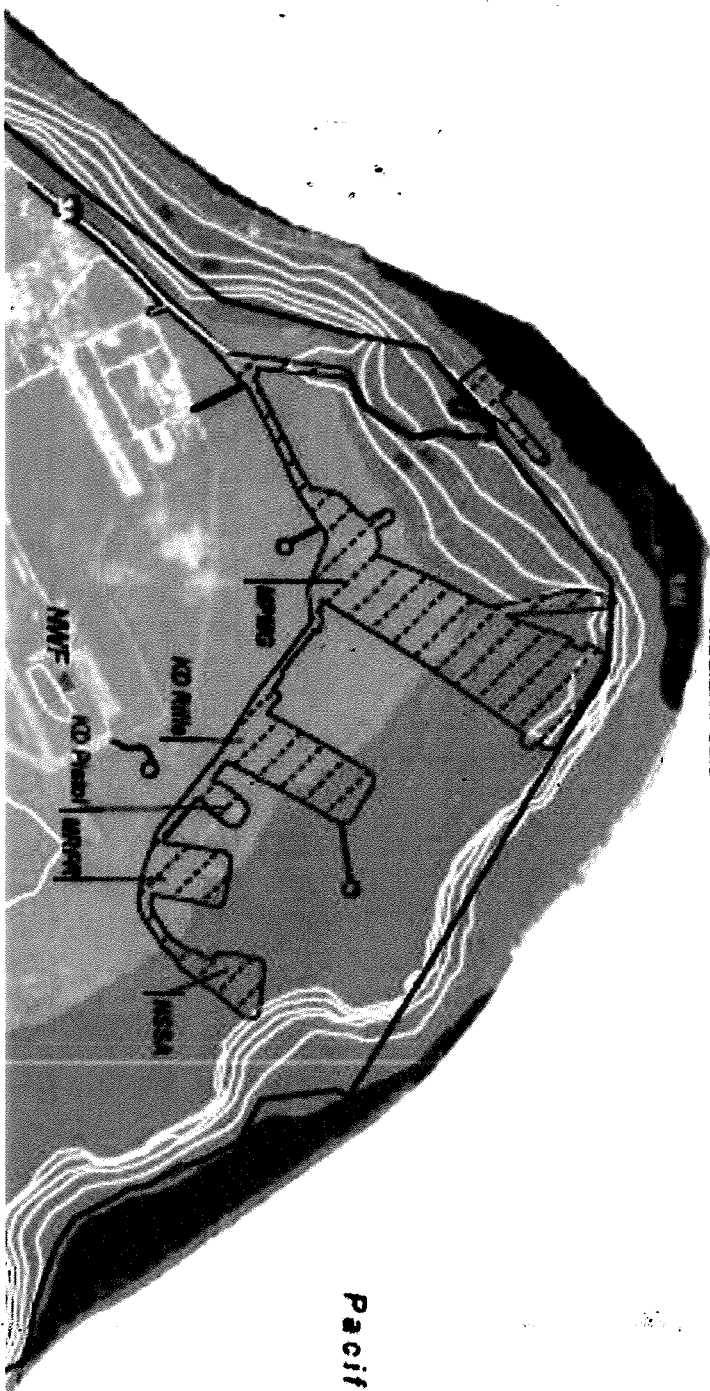

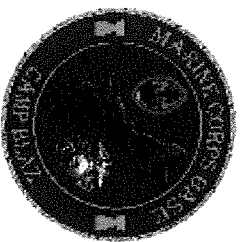


- Stipulation X.c.2.a: Status of Repository (Ms. Vera Topasna)

  - Approximately 50% of collections are currently with NPS under an agreement to curate and manage collections
  - Agreement is in process of being extended
  - Approximately 50% of collections remain in a climate controlled and secure facility on naval base guam

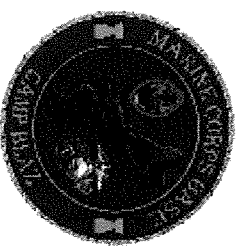
## MITIGATIONS



- Stipulation IX: SHPO Liaison
  - 2011 PA calls for a Guam Liaison to provide assistance to SHPO to help offset some of the increased workload from Relocation projects
  - SHPO preferred a third party rather than a Navy employee
  - Camp Blaz established Cooperative Agreement with Colorado State University (CSU)
  - CSU Liaison came onboard with a 20 hour per week schedule at SHPO; executed Option Year 1 to increase hours to 40 hours per week. Attracting SOL-qualified individuals was difficult with part-time work schedule.
  - SHPO recently requested an SOL-qualified individual to serve within the new 12 month period of performance; Navy looking into modifying Cooperative Agreement and assigning SOL-qualified Navy archaeologist part-time to SHPO in the interim.



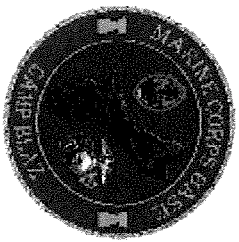

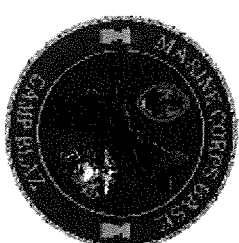

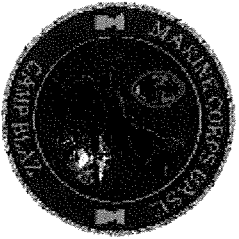
